## Brentnham Society Chair's Notes

As the gardening enthusiasts prepare for the Open Day on 8<sup>th</sup> June (of which more on page 2), another hardy annual to light up the front gardens in Brentnham returns. And no, it's not Love-in-the-mist, but the question of replacing our heritage lighting columns. "Oh, not street lamps again!" I hear the Editor (and you) cry. But yes, this regular issue refuses to go away and the day comes closer when the contractors move in to rip up our antique lamp standards and replace them...with what?

Residents may have read of the outcry in Hanwell when their old cast-iron columns started to be torn out for transfer to the so-called new "Heritage quarter" in Northfields - which is not even a conservation area. Unfortunately, this was a case where the local conservation panel had not replied to the earlier consultation, so they have few grounds for a review.

Our position is different. From the alternatives offered, our panel asked, in order of priority, for the original cast-iron columns to be retained, and otherwise opted for a replica "heritage" 5-metre column and pendant lantern, as appropriate for the scale of houses in Brentnham. What we have been told we are getting is a taller, 6m column, which in many cases would be above the top of first floor windows and particularly intrusive in the narrower roads.

Negotiations with Council officers led us to believe there was a chance that we could reinstate the lower 5m columns in at least a majority of the roads, while preserving a few of the original posts as a record. We even identified some savings to offset the increased costs. However, the new Council budget has not apparently included this, and we are still unsure of what we are getting.

Maybe, unlike some other areas, we have been too polite and followed the rules. Now is the time to raise our voices to perhaps A MORE STRIDENT TONE! ## Town Centre Redevelopment

The future of Ealing's centre hangs in the balance. While Glenkerrin is considering its options for the "Leaf" development on the Arcadia site, plans for Dickens Yard (behind the Town Hall) have been submitted by developers St. George. Together, these would add 1,400 new units housing 3,000+ residents on the two adjacent sites either side of Christchurch and Springbridge Road. As the drawing below indicates, these constructions (outlined in red) would tower over the existing buildings on New Broadway.

This scheme is of major importance to all Ealing residents. The Brentnham Society and Ealing Civic Society, as part of the Save Ealing's Centre group, will be looking hard at the details to see what can be done to

mitigate the worst effects of this potentially massive over-development. Public consultation on the Dickens Yard plans lasts until 27 June. You can see them in Perceval House during normal opening hours, or on the Council web site (reference P/2008/0156) where you can also lodge your comments - but beware,

## Sutton Garden Suburb

A small Brentham delegation travelled to south London on a bright day in February. Sutton is the unfinished masterpiece of Frederic Cavendish Pearson, who was the most flamboyant (his work is exemplified by Ludlow Road) of the Brentham architects, and whose vision was halted by WW1. We were there at the invitation of Sutton residents' association who are fighting to protect a precious piece of open land - characteristic of all garden suburbs - and sought our experience of fighting off inappropriate development. Sutton is comparatively small but has all the intimate charm of Brentham and some very fine individual houses as well as cosy cottages grouped around small greens. One positive outcome is that Sutton's residents are now lobbying to create a new association of Garden Suburbs - an initiative the Brentham Society fully supports.
