Chair's Notes

I have talked about the importance of planning before, and at our Celebration of the history and heritage of Brentham in May, Heather Moore showed some examples of how good planning can enhance individual properties and the look of the estate overall. However, there is more to this than nice-looking dormers and the removal of illegal satellite dishes.

In addition to changes within the conservation area itself, there is a requirement where buildings are erected immediately outside the area to take into account the visual impact on the area. One example of why this is important is now making itself evident.

The expansion of St Gregory's School was subject to a controversial planning application in 2011, which the Brentham Society and others opposed. After a lengthy battle, planning permission was granted and work is now nearing completion.

The new school buildings back on to the rear gardens of houses in Winscombe Crescent and Woodfield Crescent. They have been painted with panels in blue and white, as well as in a 'dayglo' shade of orange that has been described as being one used to attract the helicopters in air/sea rescues. There is a severe detrimental effect on the view from these houses, which was previously as illustrated in the picture below.

Brian Fallon, a founder member of our Society, has been leading a very spirited campaign to persuade the school to change the colours to something less strident, an initiative that has our full support. He has also received encouragement from other local groups, from



Councillors and from local MP Angie Bray. As I write this, discussions with the school continue, and we wish Brian well with his endeavours.

On a different note, after a long hard winter it is lovely to see the flowers and blossom appearing around the area. At this time of year the estate is at its most beautiful, and reminds us why we like to live here. If you are interested in gardening, do take part in our annual Open Gardens day on Sunday 9th June. It will give you the opportunity to see how other Brentham residents get the best from their gardens. More details are available elsewhere in this newsletter.

Ward Forum News

Ward Forums are the means by which local Councillors communicate with residents and hear our views. There is a small budget available for use within the ward, and we can influence the way that it is spent. The meetings are open to all residents and the Brentham Society always attends. As our estate is split across two wards, there are two Forums that interest us.

The latest Cleveland Forum was held in Copley Close on 5th February, and attendance was well down. The only item of interest to Brentham was further discussion on the proposed Pitshanger Controlled Parking Zone (CPZ). At the time of the meeting the consultation was imminent. The consultation has now taken place and we await the result. At a packed public meeting held by the Pitshanger Community Association on 17th April, the feeling was almost universally hostile, although a small but significant number of residents in the Castlebar area are worried about commuter parking.

The Hanger Hill Forum was held on 7th March in the Brentham Club. Key points for Brentham are that Brentham Way will be resurfaced in the near future, and Fowlers Walk will gain new pavements. Brunswick Road is also on the list for resurfacing if sufficient funds are available. The current programme for tree planting is now complete, and three post boxes have been restored. The first of the new street signs was on display and was approved, and the first 11 are now being produced.

Satellite Dishes and TV Aerials

Some residents may have seen the enormous satellite dish that appeared on the front of a property in Meadvale Road. A call to the letting agent of the property brought quick results and the dish was promptly removed. The enforcement department are investigating several other cases of satellite dishes in Brentham that are in breach of planning legislation. We hope for some results soon.

You may find it useful to know that we have details of a company which installs loft aerials that receive Freeview, thus avoiding the need for a dish or an aerial fixed to the chimney stack, which can result in damage to it and to roof tiles.

Some Thoughts about Our Hedges

At this time of year when many of us are tending our gardens and spreading compost about, spare a thought for the hedges of Brentham. They deserve a bit of TLC in the form of a feed of compost.

Hedges not only form very secure boundaries but also contribute so much to the unique green and leafy character of Brentham. So it was sad to discover a healthy hedge lying on the ground at the rear of a property, and a high close-boarded fence being erected. Our hope is that the fence will be removed and hedging planted so that the character of this corner of Brentham can be restored.

The Oak Processionary Moth

You may recall that a previous issue of *Brentham News* carried a warning about this pest, which is a serious threat to oak trees. Recently its caterpillars have been found on trees in the grounds of the Brentham Club, so there is a very real danger that they will spread to the mature oak trees that are such an important feature of our estate.



Please keep a sharp lookout for them on any oak trees growing in your vicinity. If some do turn up, let the Council know at once, so that the infestation can be eradicated before the trees are seriously damaged.

Author's Visit to Brentham

On a gloriously sunny day at the beginning of May we had a visit from Sarah Rutherford, who is writing a book on garden cities and suburbs which will feature Brentham Garden Suburb and will be published next year by Shire Books.
