

STOP PRESS !!! BRUNSWICK ROAD ALLOTMENTS

Residents will recall in our last newsletter that we advised you of the Council's intentions to appropriate a further 2.3 acres of the Brentham Allotments for housing. We advised you to write to the Council objecting to the proposal, and you will be glad to hear as a result of your letters and our official letter that any decision was deferred for further consideration by the Policy Committee of the Borough Council on Tuesday, 2nd September.

However, you MUST NOT BE COMPLACENT. Further representations must be made to ensure these proposals do not go through. You will remember that the Society have objected to these proposals from the outset on the following grounds:

1) Loss of excellent, much-needed allotment land in these days of economic hardship. At the present time there is a waiting list of 85 for allotments on the Brentham site. The Borough needs to preserve all its open space; it is fifth in population in the London Boroughs yet fourteenth in open space. The amount of allotment land in the Borough is below the minimum recommended by the Thorpe Report on Allotments in 1969.

2) In order to gain access to the site it is probable that the demolition of properties will be required. This will be either in Neville Road or, as now appears more likely, in Brunswick Road and this is totally unacceptable.

3) A housing development on 3.5 acres will provide 50-60 housing units which, together with the housing scheme on the Greystoke House site would mean a considerable increase in the number of children attending Montpelier School. There is not the space available for increase in school children.

4) Any development of the allotment site will generate more traffic and further stretch the already over-stretched amenities and the services in the area. The London Borough of Ealing in its own report in 1969 said that the conservation area depended on the existence of open space and once this open space is developed it will not, for any practical purposes, ever be available for open space again.

and head your letters "Proposed Appropriation of Part of the Brentham Leisure Gardens." Both these people have to be approached by the London Borough of Ealing for permission to appropriate the allotment land.
