VIEWPOINT

When we chose to purchase our house here on the Brentham Estate we were well aware of the planning constraints of a conservation area, and indeed that was one of the main reasons for our choice. We felt that this afforded protection against houses being spoiled or modernised to the detriment of the original design and so detracting from the ambience of the area.

We were also aware that one of the principal benefits of the estate was the consistent and steady growth of the value of the properties, regardless of the economic situation. We attributed this consistency to the unique character of the individual properties, which in the past had attracted like-minded people to the estate.

It is therefore, strange to see that a number of residents are destroying the very attributes that make the estate so desirable. What is even more disturbing is that we know that planning permission would not normally be granted for some of the alterations taking place. So planning law is being deliberately flouted.

What does not appear to be recognised is that all alterations to properties require planning permission, but that does not necessarily mean extra cost, neither does it mean that alterations will be refused, indeed the only ones refused are those that materially change the property and its character.

We are sure we are not alone in resenting the fact that our property value is being undermined because some people are not prepared to follow the guidelines, perhaps it is a sign of the times!



TREES

Readers will remember that in the last Newsletter we talked about donating an amount of money from the Society's funds to plant additional trees on the estate and you may be wondering what is happening. As we said in that article the Council have now planted all the trees they have funds for this year. It is now too late to plant any more trees since they need to be in the ground during Autumn to give them the best chance of survival.

Following a meeting between David Rogers and Dominic Blake of Ealing Council's Arboricultural Department to discuss the plans for tree planting and details of our proposal, it was agreed that David and Dominic will meet at the end of summer and together will tour the estate to locate the 'gaps' and create a planting scheme.

The Department are prepared to purchase suitable trees on our behalf, plant them, monitor them and water them regularly. Obviously they would be delighted if we help look after them as well. They emphasised that the cost to the Society would be only a quarter of the total cost of procuring and planting. At present the purchase cost is £30 for each tree.

Looking ahead, if you have a blank space near you and you have a choice of tree to fill it, let David Rogers have your suggestions (in writing please) to 220 Pitshanger Lane. We will include all suggestions where practicable in the planting scheme in the Autumn.

You may like to know that if you have a specific choice of tree and a location, or wish to purchase a tree as a memorial to someone then the Aboricultural Department can advise and act for you.

.....AND HEDGES

Feed and water the elderly.....hedges! Brentham hedges, so easily taken for granted, yet such a vital part of our estate are now 80-90 years old. Judging by the straggly appearance of some of them they are in urgent need of pampering.

While other plants in our gardens receive food and water the hedges are often forgotten, but they too benefit from feeding with a good fertiliser and from watering in times of drought.

The result should be healthy, robust hedges better able to resist the ravages of disease such as honey fungus and better able to keep out unwanted intruders. While it is easy to climb over a fence, a good hedge is virtually impossible to get through or over!

RUBBISH

It is good to see that most people who read our article on leaving rubbish on pavements have ceased to do so. However a walk around the estate on collection days shows some residents are still leaving rubbish sacks on the pavements, perhaps they do not realise that they are committing an offence. We have been advised that the council are monitoring houses who do not comply with the regulations and will contact them prior to taking action (a fine). Don't be caught out! Keep your sacks in the garden.
