NEWS

Don't be dished

Subtlety and satellite dishes don't usually go together and on an Article IV Conservation Area like Brentham, their installation can sometimes be problematic. Planning guidelines place restrictions on where you can put them on Brentham buildings, but improvements in dish design and technology now mean that there are dishes which meet the guidelines and blend in with the surroundings. A large white dish of the old kind, recently installed on the estate, attracted a number of complaints to Ealing's Planning Department. But the owner was able to replace it with a much smaller and neater dish at ground floor level with no loss of reception quality, so everyone was happy. One of the alternatives is of course cable but that brings with it those ugly cabinets you may have seen appear on Pitshanger Lane. The company responsible was made to apply for retrospective planning permission and although, on this occasion, were not asked to re-site the cabinets they have been told by Ealing Council that, in future, planning permission must be sought in advance and that the Council will insist on installations being in keeping with the aims of conservation. But think of it this way - it won't be long before the whole estate is cabled which could lead to the demise of all television aerials and telegraph poles, themselves hardly aesthetically pleasing!

However don't get complacent - if you see any work commencing ring the Council to check on the existence of planning consent.

Centenary Book

Your last chance to buy shares - scheme closes in April.

Despite a number of exciting developments, this is a short report for this edition of *Brentham News* as the second edition of the *Brentham Centenary Book Newsletter* will be out in March with all the latest book news in detail, but here are some key headlines :

- The great news is that we've raised over £23,000 so far, thanks to tremendous local support.
- The Co-Partnership Share Scheme continues to be a huge success; we've sold over 250 shares, raising over £10,000 by this means alone.
- Ealing's Mayor, Cllr Phillip Portwood, and Ealing North MP Steve Pound will be presented with share numbers 200 and 250 respectively, on the estate at lunch time on Thursday 9th March. We're hoping to involve some of Brentham's long-standing residents, and make the presentation outside a Brentham house if the weather is fine.
- 30 businesses in Pitshanger Lane have now signed up as Business Shareholders - with promises of more to come. We thank them for their support.
- Aileen Reid has delivered most of the manuscript, and it's rather more than we expected. It's all fascinating stuff, so the book will be larger than originally planned - 256 pages. It will be full of illustrations - more than 200, including some in full colour. All this will cost more than our original estimate, so we've had to extend our fund raising target to £30,000.
- The Brentham Heritage Society, the offshoot of the Brentham Society set up to organise things like the centenary book, has had its charitable status approved in principal by the Charity Commissioners. We're sure this will boost our fundraising efforts with trusts and foundations.

If you haven't bought your Individual or Family share or you are encouraging someone else to buy one, the Scheme must close on 30th April to ensure that all names are included in the book.

Ever thought of market gardening?

Allotments have always played an integral part of Brentham and there used to be annual horticultural shows where residents would display their produce.

There are a number of plots within the boundary of the estate but there is also a large site between Brunswick Road and the Western Avenue where the Brentham Allotment and Gardens Society is based. The society has existed for 60 years and

membership of the society is £2. Members can buy seeds, fertilisers and tools at much reduced prices from the trading hut which is open on Sunday and Wednesday mornings throughout the year. There are some plots available for rent at approximately £50/year although reductions apply for pensioners - but you don't have to rent a plot to be a member and take advantage of the trading hut. The society is in danger of closing down due to a drop in membership over the last ten years and is looking for new members. Their annual general meeting is on Sunday 19th March - come and give your support.
