EDITORIAL

The re-establishment of a Grounds Committee, announced in this edition of the BULLETIN, will doubtless be gladly welcomed, particularly by playing members, as a most encouraging item of news.

The need for such a co-ordinating body has long been patently obvious to those members who in any way are or have been responsible for entertaining visiting teams, or those who have enjoyed the hospitality of other clubs of equal standing. Especially at the present time when, owing to the effects of the dry weather experienced last winter, so many items of grounds rehabilitation need to be carried out, together with the added responsibilities arising from a considerably increased playing membership, many problems have to be settled which should properly be the joint concern of all outdoor Sections.

There can be no doubt that, working properly, the Grounds Committee can achieve much in improving the present standard of playing conditions, and it is to be hoped that not only will they be allowed to function to the full capacity of their endeavours, but also that they will be given the whole-hearted support of all members for whose ultimate benefit the Committee's labours will be directed.

CRICKET

The season has opened with some lovely weather, in the main, and wickets have been more reminiscent of August than of May. In consequence, batsmen have run into form early and there have

been many big totals.

The first eleven have won three matches, drawn three, and lost one, their only defeat being at Ashford, by the narrow margin of one run. Shepherds Bush, Mill Hill Park and Polytechnic were all convincingly beaten, and all three drawn games were going our way at the end. Felton and J. Swann have been the most consistent run-getters, whilst Alston enjoyed a successful Whitsun with the bat, scoring half-centuries against Ealing Dean and West Herts. The return of Alston to the side has also added strength and variety to the bowling, in which department the skipper, Frank Ahl, has been well amongst the wickets, in addition to scoring 53 in the opening game of the season, when the very fine score of 252 was made for the loss of five wickets.

The "A" XI lost their first two matches, but then showed a marked improvement, winning four and drawing two of the remaining six games. The bowling has been consistently hostile, and whilst wickets have been well shared, mention must be made of the good form of Jack Howard. The batting, latterly, has been more reliable, and a series of most enjoyable and successful games were played. The skipper, Len Haworth, apart from bowling many good overs, took part in a most exciting stand with Truman against Mill Hill Park which turned a match almost lost into a highly meritorious draw. Truman, Lewry and Sones have added a welcome and youthful reinforcement to last season's regulars, amongst whom Spice and Dwyer scored excellent fifties.

The "B" XI have won two and lost three matches this season. Many more members are available and it can be expected that the side will become stronger as the season progresses. Smith as a bowler, and Parker as bowler and batsman, have been the two mainstays, but Vincent and Honan have also had some success and the latter shows signs that he may develop into a useful batsman.

The Committee has arranged for the Frank H. Sharpe Memorial Score-Box to be officially inaugurated during the game on June 17th, against D. Gunn's XI, and it is their sincere wish that as many as possible of Frank's friends will be present to witness the short ceremony, which will take place at 7 p.m. at the Pavilion.
