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## Editorial.

WE hope that if Brentham has no wish for intellectual fare it will stay right away from the Institute on Tuesday evenings during the coming season. Indeed, it will be best to refrain from studying the published list of lectures and lecturers; the risk would be too great. The less determined, who may still be curious, should entirely avoid peeping through the windows or listening at the keyholes. Climbing on to the balcony to press one's nose against the sky-lights is a temptation that must be thrust from the mind, and the timidity that is unable to say "No!" to an invitation to "Come along, just to make one" must give way to something sterner. We do not like warning our readers against anything, for Brentham always knows its own mind, and persists even to stubbornness, but there is a real danger of Brentham losing its characteristic prejudice against anything that may be a stretch of imagination be described as educational.

The fact is that the Lecture Committee has arranged a programme that would in a country town stir the populace to a frenzy of anticipatory excitement; every other attraction would have to take a back seat. No one need fear that state of affairs in Brentham. It will be quite safe to go ahead with all the other programmes. No one will let a game of hockey or a dance pass lest an injured ankle should prevent a visit to a lecture or debate. If Brentham will just regard attendance on Tuesday evenings at the Institute as a minor duty, one that can be avoided on any respectable pretence, there will be no vacant chairs, the walls will be decorated by the incorrigible wallflowers and even the window sills will be polished.

The "Mugs' Alley" joke has become a tragedy, and the end of the Tennis Season should see the sole humour of a serious game in Brentham relegated to forgetfulness. Unfortunately, there are amongst us not a few people whose sense of humour is the Aunt Sally of their craving for a feeling of simulated superiority. Their play on the courts has not provided that feeling, so they have avoided the "Alley" and pitied the "Mugs."



It may be forgotten news to these people that those awkward-minded lubbers who, for reasons of their own, have shown a preference for the courts behind the Institute pay just the same fee and belong to the same club as those who have not dared to be seen among the unfashionable since the naming of "Mugs' Alley" sent a ripple of laughter right along the courts. ## BRENTHAM CLUB AND INSTITUTE.

On the craft work side of the Committee's activities attempts are being made to revive the woodwork classes, and a meeting of those interested will be held shortly, when a definite scheme will be submitted.
