INSTITUTE GENERAL MEETING.

THE 'ITE representative spent a most enjoyable evening at the Meeting of Institute Members on Monday, October 17th.

Very sensibly the subjects for discussion were divided into three sections: Finance, Outdoor Activities and Indoor Activities. The discussion took the form of a dialogue between Mr. S. F. Perry, on behalf of the Committee, and various members, and like the curate's egg was good in parts. So far as finance is concerned, the Institute Committee is to be congratulated on the position in view of exceptionally heavy expenditure. The discussion on outdoor activities brought out some strong criticism of the way in which the grounds have been kept, from Mr. J. Clegg and others, and here Mr. John Hearn intervened in the dialogue, in defence of the Committee. Mr. Hearne's speech was a gem of humour, conscious and unconscious, but the 'ITE man gathered that all would have been well had it not been for the abnormal weather, and that all will or may be well next year. The meeting was over-critical of Mr. John Hearn, and failed to recognise the great amount of voluntary work he has put in. When it came to indoor activities the dialogue took a new turn, and a most interesting discussion on the ethics of money prizes for whist drives took place. Mr. Frank Chambers, Mr. J. H. Ward, Mr. Will Sutton, and others took part.

One was amused at the subtle distinctions drawn. Mr. Chambers, for instance, did not object to playing for silver, provided it was manufactured into spoons, but had a strong moral repugnance to playing for the same silver made into half-crowns.

Finally this momentous question was referred to the Social Committee, and the Chairman, Mr. Allport, hurriedly declared the meeting closed, avoiding a long argument on the meaning of the word political in Clause 2 of the Bye-laws.

LECTURES AND DEBATES.

THE opening night was a great success, and Mr. Ernest Wellbeloved's recital of poems and prose, ranging from the classical to the broadly comic, thoroughly pleased the audience. The discussion on "Labour and the Middle Classes," opened by Mr. F. J. Shaw, Secretary of the Cobden Club, was splendidly attended, but the resulting debate did not "go" with the necessary amount of sparkle.

The second lecture of the season was on "Danish Rural Life," and Mr. J. Nugent Harris thoroughly interested the large audience, and incidentally gave them something to think of in his vivid account of the splendid organisation of Danish Small Holdings, and the resulting fine crops. Thanks are due to Mr. T. Nicholson for his able manipulation of the lantern.

Miss Chick made an excellent opening speech at the debate on the 25th ult., contending: "That National security is not dependent on force." A keen debate followed, ably controlled by the Chairman, Mr. Kinsman. Ladies were present in considerable force, but, unfortunately, none of them participated audibly.

COMMENT upon the General Meeting of the 17th October is hardly necessary ; the meeting may or may not have accomplished its object entirely, but members may rely upon the Committee giving careful consideration to the few suggestions which were made. It was naturally gratifying to receive the congratulations of the Secretary of Ealing Tenants, Ltd., especially if we may infer that our questions of capital expenditure will receive sympathetic attention at the hands of Ealing Tenants, Ltd. The attendance and tone of the meeting, whether in criticism or support of the Committee, were signs of the healthy life of the Institute, and it is regretted that there was insufficient time to proceed with further items on the accounts presented.

Judging from questions asked, it appears necessary to mention that residents on the Estate of Ealing Tenants, Ltd., may become members of the Institute without applying for shares ; and this is, of course, pointed out to new members, who are invited to exercise their option, or to consider the matter and apply later. It is found in practice that some residents have no desire to become shareholders, but applications for shares may be made to the Committee on the prescribed form at any time. Bye-law No. 4 defines membership clearly, and the Secretary would be glad if members would read their own Bye-laws. Invitations to take copies have frequently been made, and when copies have been placed about the Institute they have remained untouched.

The privileges attached to shareholder membership are principally those of management. A non-shareholder on being appointed a Committeeman or other officer of a section must apply for shares ; and, of course, a non-shareholder has a vote at a business meeting of the Club.

BRENTHAM CLUB AND INSTITUTE SHARE AND HOLIDAY CLUB, BRANCH 2 (HOLIDAY).

The first Annual Meeting of the above was held in the Institute on Wednesday, October 12th, and was very sparsely attended. Last year the membership numbered just over 50, and over £300 was saved towards the expenses of a holiday at the seaside. The idea of the Holiday Branch is that members should pay in weekly any amount from one shilling to six, and then when the period of holidays comes round draw out money equivalent to a sovereign for each share held, or from two to twelve pounds according to the number of shares held. Membership is open to all residents on the Estate, and this year children can join with one share, *i.e.*, pay in sixpence weekly and draw out a sovereign for holidays. The Club runs for 40 weeks, and the opening night is Monday, November 7th. The Secretary is Mr. J. W. Allen, 14, North View, and the Club is open at the Institute every Monday evening from 8 to 9 o'clock.

Educational.

Horticultural Society.

The balance-sheet for the financial year ending 30th September, shows a trading record, sales amounting to £255. At the commencement of the year we had to tread warily, but with increased experience and resources we were able to take up fresh items. Members will, no doubt, realise that it is a very difficult matter to estimate, without risk of financial loss, the exact requirements for a year. On behalf of the Trading Committee, I must express appreciation of the consideration shown when it has not been possible to supply a particular fancy in seeds, fertilisers, &c. Under the present system, the Trading Committee may under-estimate possible requirements, and the difficulties will, in the circumstances, be readily realised.

The question of the future rests entirely with the members. There is every prospect of another record. Last month 5,800 bulbs were distributed in ten days. To date over 300 rose trees are on order. Next month we shall be ordering seed potatoes. It will assist the Trading Committee, and perhaps avoid disappointment, if members will kindly furnish a rough estimate of their probable requirements of the various varieties. In 1920 there was a demand for early varieties; last year, for some reason, more late varieties were demanded. Considering the amount of voluntary work put in by the Committee, it would be disastrous if we handled a large consignment with resultant loss. To avoid this possibility, I ask all members kindly to furnish the necessary information.
