THE MONTH'S LECTURES.

THE Lectures and Debates continue to attract crowded audiences. On 1st November, Lieut. Leo. Walmsley, M.C., described the "War on the Seashore" between the various animals most vividly. His address was illustrated by a number of original lantern slides.

Mr. Maurice Hulbert opened the debate on the 8th November, and spoke upon "Economics and Unemployment. Mr. Hulbert's suggested remedies for unemployment provoked an interesting discussion, and here it may be said that the debates are becoming a little one-sided. owing to the preponderance of debaters who speak from the Labour point of view. Debaters holding Coalition, Liberal or Conservative opinions are urged to attend and speak. The two remaining lectures for November were respectively, on the 15th by Mr. T. F. Finucane, on "The Romance of Wireless—a vividly interesting lecture, this closing with a promise from Mr. Finucane to come down again and give an actual demonstration—and "The Wonders of Fish Lief," by Mr. W. A. Hunter, on the 22nd, a most informative lecture, describing the habits of fish and their various bird enemies, illustrated by some splendid lantern slides.

Mr. T. Nicholson, the honorary operator of the lantern, must have a special word of praise for the prompt and efficient manner in which he carries out his duties.

THE PLAYERS' PERFORMANCE.

BRENTHAM residents had one of their periodic delights on the evening of November 19th, when the Brentham Players gave the second performance of their seventh season. Incidentally the Players proved three things: first, that Brentham's Hall has been outgrown; second, that even if the boiler is out of order the atmosphere can be in a short time made suffocatingly hot; and third that, with several of its leading players resting, the Society can find adequate cast for four plays without anyone doing two jobs in the same evening.

The Plays produced were "Shades of Night," "Bobbie settles down," "The Monkey's Paw," and "Between 8 and 8.30," the last-named by *our* Mr. W. Macfarlane. Each deserves a separate criticism, but a general one must suffice. Not one case of bad casting can be pointed out, and in some cases, particularly those of the characters played by Miss E. Brampton, Miss S. Salisbury and Mr. McAllen, the parts fitted like a glove. Miss C. Martin and Mr. A. Collier were incommoded by the smallness of the room, which two very solid ghosts (Miss D. Carter and Mr. J. H. Ward) easily filled; their chief efforts were directed to avoiding bumping into intangible spirits. Mrs. M. Kell and Mr. Fairchild produced the best intensive acting of the evening, and were ably assisted by Mr. Toms (an old soldier) and Mr. C. Cooper (their son). Mr. W. Middleton's appearance as Mr. Sampson gave a false impression of his part; not usually does an undertaker's man come to break the news.

Very natural was Mrs. Blomeley, and, as her maid, Miss V. Morris did her little well. Mrs. Fairchild showed quite praiseworthy dignity, even when Benjy (Mr. Macfarlane) was raving at his mother-in-law and the audience was drowning them both in roars of laughter. In a small part, Mrs. Reading kept the fun at its proper level when the others needed to take breath.

Mr. W. Deller's pianoforte playing was enjoyed by those near by. The week's chatter prevented anyone else enjoying it.

EALING HOUSING AND TOWN PLANNING ORDER.

THIS Order has a direct interest for Residents on the Estate.

The land lying between the Estate and Hanger Lane is scheduled for building with not more than twelve houses to the acre. The future arterial road will cross Hanger Lane at Greystoke Farm, continue north of the line and pass diagonally across Pinches Field, just missing the Rifle Range corner of the Recreation Ground. The footpath to Brentham Halt is to be a 40 feet road, joining up with an extension of Fowler's Walk. An alternative to the latter proposal is being considered, viz., making a straight road across Pinches Field into Meadvale Road. The land north of the line is scheduled for factories, and provision is made for a further extension of the "Reservoir" Park.

It should be understood that the schemes may not be carried out for many years, but when development does take place it must be on the lines laid down in the Order.

A Public Enquiry will be held by the Ministry of Health into the Scheme.

Rifle Club.

Billiards.

The Billiards and Snooker Handicaps are now in full swing, and by the time these lines are in print the second round should be drawing to a close. Although the number of entries is fairly good it falls short of the Committee's hopes. Discrepancies in the handicap figures there are bound to be, but we would ask members to keep in mind the fact that owing to the lack of interest taken in billiards during the early part of the season it has been very difficult to judge many members' positions in the handicap list. Absence from the billiards room can hardly be put forward as a plea for a long handicap, and if only members would show up in the billiards room more often the work of the committee would be much easier when the question of handicaps has to be considered. One member has expressed his disapproval of his handicap by conceding his opponents a "walk-over"; we hope that his sporting instincts (Brenthamites have a reputation as sportsmen) will lead him to reconsider his decision. We should like to call the attention of all concerned to the closing dates of the rounds. The rule with regard to the cancelling of games not played off by the appointed date will be strictly enforced.

The first flying handicap (50 up) resulted in a great fight between Messrs. B. Line and H. P. Sebborn in the final, the latter eventually winning. The number of entries was very gratifying and some close games resulted. We hope that the interest will be sustained in the next "flyer" which it is intended to promote shortly.

The five-minute competition held last month produced 47 entries, premier honours falling to Messrs. Toms and Sebborn, who tied.

In our first match against Mr. S. K. Hobday's team we registered a victory by 42 points and 4 games to 2. The following represented the B.C. and I. :—Messrs. Interesting leaflets dealing with "Reversion" or Nettlehead of Black Currant and Nitrogenous Manures, recently issued by the Ministry of Agriculture, are available for those members who are interested in these subjects. Copies of the leaflets may be obtained at the Shed.

A considerable quantity of lime was distributed in January last. It is not proposed to obtain further supplies unless the demand is sufficient to warrant the handling of a consignment. Will those members who propose to lime their gardens or allotments kindly notify the Trading Secretary.
