The Concerts Committee at its first Concert of the season, on December 8th, attained success except in one particular: it did not sell sufficient tickets to fill the Hall. The programme was an attractive one, the Hall was quite pleasantly warmed and lighted, and the Committee members were displaying their best smiles. The mistake was on the tickets, some of which were priced at fourpence more than the others. We hope that this was a printer's error, and that the Committee did not really mean to encourage that spirit of snobbery that has but recently intruded itself upon Brentham's social life. There are not two prices for a dance, nor are there "stalls and gallery" distinctions at lectures. Cricket, tennis, bowls, whist, hockey, and football proceed very comfortably without any "distinctions." Even the centre billiards table has resisted the temptation to rear itself on its hind legs and proclaim itself reserved at a higher price for "the swells." Then why was this particular mistake made? We do not believe that anyone really wished to pay fourpence more than some other people for a seat at a Brentham Concert, and we are quite sure that the fourpence less kept people away. The case of the Dramatic performances is a totally different matter; the front seats are reserved for those who deserve them, the Players' members, and the "price" of these is really only a nominal one. There is a demand for an occasional Saturday Concert at the Institute, sufficient demand to fill the Hall and ensure financial success, but not while two prices are charged. We shall look for "one price only and sit where you like" in the next Concert announcement.

Boxing Day was one of the best days at the Institute, for it reproduced just the idea for which the building was erected. Parents and children in one large happy party occupied the Hall, and at one billiard table at least an inter-family billiard tournament was in progress. If we could get back to that spirit of things in the social life here we might miss one or two faces, but the end of our troubles, financial and social, would be in sight, complaints against juniors would be just matters for family discipline, and all the threatened cures for the unfortunate age clashings would be unnecessary.

The Western Avenue approaches Brentham, and before next autumn the whole of our particular part of the Brent Valley will be hopelessly spoilt. Of course it can't be helped, and although the beginning of the end is upon us the end of the end is not yet. For a time at least allotments will still be worked along the slope although a strip will disappear, two golf courses will be slightly rearranged and a rifle range may become a drain pipe. But it needs no prophet to envisage the conditions under which Brentham's main frontage will be facing Wembley, and the Brentham-London line of communication will be by way of Harlesden.

### Horticultural Society.

At the meeting held on December 7th it was decided to curtail the activities of the Society for the year 1924. No Shows will be held. What small trading facilities will be available will be the subject of a future announcement.

The new road known as the Western Avenue is expected to be commenced with the new year, and allotment holders who rent the plots bearing the following numbers will be displaced: 215 to 223, 202 to 208A, 172D to 178, 175A, and 172 A, B, C. Also 171 and 170. All numbers are inclusive. Holders of plots in the near vicinity are advised that the works in connection with the new road will probably cause them some disturbance, and arrangements have been made that these plotholders shall have the opportunity of transferring to vacant plots at the S.W. end of the field as far as vacancies permit.

We have been requested by the Town Council to remind those Allotment holders who have not paid the rent of their plots for the current year, and have not given notice in the terms of the agreement in writing of their intention to vacate their plots, that they are still liable for the payment of

same.

### Share and Loan Club.

The Committee have much pleasure in submitting their third annual report. The number of members for the year 1923 was 83, which was 14 more than in 1922. It will be seen, therefore, that the membership is still on the small side, and the Committee hope that there will be a much larger influx of members for the coming year otherwise the desirability of continuing the Club will have to be seriously considered by the Committee.

There ought to be at the very least a membership of 200.

The number of shares entitled to dividend this year are 410, as against 350 in 1922. The turnover has also considerably increased, and it will be seen from the balance sheet that nearly £800 has passed through the hands of the Secretary this year. Under these circumstances it was hoped that a larger dividend would be available for distribution, but owing to the fact that the Club was only allowed 5 per cent. interest from Ealing Tenants, Ltd., as against 6 per cent. last year, and that there are more members among whom to divide the profits, the amount only works out to 11d. per share, as against 1/- last year. There have been over 60 loans to members, but in a good many cases the same member borrowed twice, which means that those who did not have a loan benefited from those members who did. This is a sound argument in favour of the Committee's recommendation last year altering the rules, so that members who do not have a loan are fined one shilling, but which was defeated at the Annual General Meeting.

The Club commenced again on Monday, December 31st, at 8 p.m., at the usual meeting place, and members are invited to use their best endeavours to advertise the Club in order to bring about a substantial

increase in the membership.

### Billiards.

The second round of Billiards and Snooker Handicaps are drawn and

all games must be played by January 14th.

Several members have been enquiring when the "Flyers" start. The committee will run them when the present handicaps are more advanced. They hope to begin the first on January 25th, a list will be posted in the Billiard Room.

There will also be a list posted during the end of this month for a four handed Snooker Competition. It is not decided as yet if the names are to be drawn together, or members choose their partners and run on Handicap lines. Further particulars will be posted on notice board.

The Concerts Committee have decided to make a big effort to restore the musical side, and have co-opted two further members.
