EVENTS

"A Pageant of Children," given by Brentham Children, under direction of Mr. P. D. Fairchild and Mr. P. Ottaway, was produced on three evenings: Wednesday the 18th, Friday the 20th, and Saturday the 21st ult. The Editor sent me along to see it on the first evening with strict instructions to be severely critical. I went on the two following evenings as well, and if there is a repeat I

shall go again, paying for my right of entrance, too.

I must say a few words about the audiences first. The Wednesday night audience was numerically up to expectations, filling about two-thirds of the Hall, but the numbers present on Friday and Saturday were nothing like what the quality of the show deserved. Certainly a great proportion of Brentham people did not go near the Pageant; I am sorry for them. Certainly, almost one half of the audience each night was made up of people one never runs across in Brentham. Those people knew a good thing when they heard of it.

I can do no more than give the striking features of each First, the Nursery Rhymes, an altogether charming display of natural child-expression. All who saw this scene will long remember the musical games, with their haunting tunes, "London Bridge" and "Sally Waters." Miss G. Copson's work was so well

done as to be almost entirely concealed.

Next the Toy Ballet, produced by Miss Doris Middleton. In this we saw speciality dancing and gesture done by promising young pupils, and a Song Scena, "Chili Bom Bom," that fetched the house down.

The Croquet Lawn Scene made one pinch oneself to make quite sure that one was not dreaming. It was just "straight out of the book" as we say: speaking and action perfect. Mrs. Foord produced this scene, and it was actually encored each evening. The Bower Scene from "Midsummer Night's Dream" was cast to perfection: delightful fairies, the subjects of Oberon and Titania, and the clumsiest set of workmen actors you ever saw, with Bully Bottom to perfection. Mr. Ephgrave was responsible for this scene, and we now know that he has kept at least one of his abilities for Brentham's benefit until last. "The Black Spot," from R. L. S.'s "Treasure Island," came last. Mrs. Nicholson and Mr. Macfarlane are to be congratulated upon the good result of their coaching of short duration. Long John Silver improved a hundred per cent. on the first performance, and his co-treasure-hunters supported him admirably. Two part songs by four singers, trained by Mrs. J. G. Taylor, and the Violin Solos of Miss C. Taylor, formed pleasant and well-executed interludes. Miss D. Armfield on Wednesday, Miss I. Weber on Friday, and the Belgrave Orchestra on Saturday filled in all the waits with merry music.

Brentham is surely proud of its children, and thankful to those who work hard with them. But Brentham must show its

appreciation.

As this month marks the close of another Winter Season, it is as well to take note of much progress which has been made in indoor events. The policy of the Dance Committee in arranging as many "special" dances as possible has proved highly successful. The Whist and Bridge Drives maintain a good regular attendance, and Table Tennis is still popular. It has been difficult at times to provide regular accommodation for the latter, but the necessity for another large Hall is apparent. Brentham Players have provided drama as excellently as in former seasons, despite the handicap of very limited use of the stage for rehearsals. The Billiard Room has hardly justified the recent expenditure on renovations and equipment, but this is no doubt to some extent due to the call on the time of players by other interests in the building. Committee work has a good deal to do with this, and it might be advisable to make an effort to carry on with less Committee work. The alterations in the arrangements for children have been justified in every way, and the juniors are as well provided for as ever. It remains to be seen whether sufficient interest is forthcoming to continue this work for the juniors. The effective staging of Pageants, Mlay Day Festivals, &c., entail an enormous amount of work, especialy when the costumes, properties, scenic and other effects are made on the premises. It saves a lot of expense, but is very hard work. The Ladies' Committee anticipates a successful result of their present efforts for the Sale of Work in December, and an excellent start has been made. The catering venture is proving an asset to the Club from every point of view, and the Sub-Committee responsible is to be congratulated on the result of its efforts. Efficient catering will, no doubt, help the Institute in many ways, and members are requested to help by suggestions and otherwise. It is hoped that further improvements will be possible shortly.
