OUT AND ABOUT.

Hullo Brentham! THE BRENTHAMITE calling! Stand by for the last six of the first "century." Here is No. 95.

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In June, 1914, all Brentham was preparing for its own sports day to be held on the 27th. A full list of adult events was prepared, and then, unexpectedly, the day was declared "off" owing to the absence of financial support. Since then we have had a war and three contests for the Thornton Cup. Now again, July 12th, the date fixed for sports is "off" as far as the seniors are concerned. The reason apparently is that no other garden suburb wishes (some say, dares) to challenge Brentham for the Thornton Cup. The fact is that in getting more athletic Brentham has become less sporting. The Sports Committee that, in the absence of a Thornton Cup contest, cannot feel sufficiently confident of success to warrant it in going ahead may well consider whether or not concentration by the few upon various cups has resulted in deterring the many.

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A similar effect may have been noticed in matters horticultural. Throughout the years in which the Gardening Shield was offered for competition, there was a steady decline in the number of Brentham gardens that made any attempt at appearing beautiful. Certainly just a few reached a higher standard than had been reached previously, but their very existence bred hopelessness in the breasts of other garden owners. Gradually since the withdrawal of that shield the former general standard has been reached again.

We do not say that these are matter of cause and effect, but there they are and we hope that our mention of them may give rise to thought and discussion.

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The question of Brentham garages for Brentham motorists is likely to be a burning one before very long. There is room on the Estate for a garage owned and run by Brentham people. Few gardens on the estate are suitable for the erection of motor-sheds, and if they were the provision of entrances sufficiently wide would be an insurmountable difficulty. Centralisation and co-operation are the means of solution, and although we are, personally, only very remotely interested in the matter, we hope that Brentham motorists will put at least their heads together if they cannot their cars. We see in prospect the day when all Brentham will go shopping by car and it will be not at all convenient or dignified if the shops must be passed on foot before they can be reached by car.

Ealing Hospital Cup Tennis Competition.

Cricket.

The Cricket Season has started but not the cricket weather. Our first West Drayton the 1st team were beaten. It was obvious members were very much short of practice, for bowling, batting and fielding were below the usual standard. Gordon Clarke alone showed good form and his wellplayed 43 retrieved the situation after a disastrous start. West Drayton easily passed our total of 96, our bowlers presenting them with a liberal supply of full tosses and long hops, and the fielders obliged by dropping

the catches. They eventually compiled 224 for 7.
Against the G.W.R. at Castle Bar Park a great improvement was shown in all departments. After heavy showers during the morning the wicket was soft and drying. H. Clegg played himself in carefully and then wasted no time in flogging the bowling while the conditions were favourable. His 52 was a characteristic knock. Rigg also played well for 26. Later batsmen found run-getting more difficult, and G.W.R. found Freddy Watts in particular a difficult problem on the cut up wicket. Freddy bowled in his best form, took 4 wickets out of the six for 27, and had time allowed, would have cleared out the G.W.R. rabbits and given us a win. J. Tuffrey of the G.W.R. did well to score 31 not out, though he had some lucky escapes.

The 2nd's lost against West Drayton. They could only score 20, and the fielders and bowlers were kind to Drayton who scored 174. Against Rivercourt some improvement was shown, Rivercourt being dismissed for 76, but our batsmen all failed except Ern. Huggett who made 23 not out, he could find no one to stay with him.
