PLAYERS' PERFORMANCE.

On Saturday, January 10th, the Brentham Players gave their third performance of the tenth season and the play produced was "Our Flat," a farcical comedy in three acts by Mrs. Musgrave. It was surprising at the end of the first act to find everyone in the corridors and at the bar talking of that act as a "poor show, so far," and blaming the players and playwright equally. This sort of talk is the usual thing in Brentham and probably more or less everywhere. People forget that first acts are necessary, and usually, as in this case, only serve the purpose of opening out the general conditions of the action, and showing the general relationships of the characters. Nothing very much happens of course, the players have a somewhat chilly job and the audience, not seeing to what it is all leading up, gets fidgetty, and, with a sigh of relief as the curtain comes down, goes out to swear over the coffee that it has a mind to go home. All this is forgotten, it certainly was in this case, during the later acts and at the close, with the whole picture revealed, there are congratulations for everybody.

The outstanding successes of the evening were Miss Irene Milner as Margery, Mr. Alex Collier as Reginald, and Mr. Macfarlane as Nathaniel Glover, an eccentric (very!) theatrical manager. The surprise of the evening was Miss Milner, who though lacking in power was perfectly at home in her difficult part. The Players have kept her in small parts far too long.

The Bella of Miss Salisbury was excellent, in fact, without her it would have been a simple comedy punctuated by polite smiles. She made us all roar!

Miss Edgar and Mr. Cyril Royce were content to be quite tuneful second fiddles, and Mr. J. H. Ward had one of his heavy father parts, delaying the inevitable "Forgive me, my children," until almost too late.

Mrs. Fairchild deserves a special word of praise; her Madame Volant was a little bit of art standing by itself.

Mr. Hender, Mr. Deed, Mr. Middleton and Mr. Kinsman added considerably to the fun in the small parts, and last, because most difficult to appraise, was the small but important work of Mrs. Daniels as a petulant girl. She was that exactly, and so no new feature for Brentham parents, brothers, aunts, cousins and grandparents who made up the audience.

"Chuck all the Institute Committee out and make a new start."


"Let's have a "kid" proof Institute and grounds."
