EVENTS.

The Society.

Visitors.

Members may obtain tickets enabling friends to partake of the privileges of members for a day for 6d. each, or for a week for 1s. 6d.

Visitors to the Junior section (12 and over) may be introduced by a member for a day on payment of 3d. If a member desires to introduce a visitor to this section for a longer period, application should be made to the Hon. Secretary.
